Winter Weather Notice

On days with inclement winter weather, our daily Mass schedule will be suspended. When a State of Emergency has been declared, Mass will not be celebrated. If it is snowing when you wake up, Mass will not be celebrated. If it has snowed, and the roads are impassable, Mass will not be celebrated. Although Mass is not publicly celebrated, a priest will offer the Mass intention privately.

Please check your email for the most up-to-date information. This applies to daily Mass only, with the safety of our parishioners and staff as a priority.

Requirements for Godparents for Baptism

As a Godparent, your responsibility is to foster the faith of your Godchild and to reflect to your Godchild the meaning of life of Catholic discipleship. The Code of Canon Law specifies: a Godparent must be at least 16 yrs old, a fully initiated Catholic (Baptism, Eucharist and Confirmation), if married, be in a valid Catholic marriage, and live a life of active faith in the Catholic Church. A Godparent Eligibility Form will be required from your Church. A baptized non-Catholic may not be a Godparent but may serve as a witness along with a Catholic Godparent. Non-baptized persons may not serve as witnesses or Godparents. Being a Godparent is a joyful, yet serious obligation. Baptisms will not be scheduled until the Eligibility Form is received by our office.

Keeping Cremains at Home?

Keeping cremated remains at home may be a sign of love and grief, but family members may not understand that the departed loved one now belongs to the entire community of faith and not just to his or her closest relatives.

If you are holding the human cremated remains of a loved one at home, whether they departed recently or many years ago, consider bringing them to a Catholic cemetery. The dignified and permanent interment of a Catholic's cremated remains in a sacred place properly recognizes the Order of Christian Funerals.

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Placing cremated remains in a sacred place also prevents the faithful departed from being forgotten or from being shown a lack of respect. This is more likely to happen as time goes on and family members closest to the departed also pass away.
